

What is a First-Gen Scholar?

Someone is a first-generation college student if their parent(s) or guardian(s) did not complete a 4-year college or university degree. Other family's (i.e., grandparents') education levels do not influence first-generation status.

According to the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA), 56% of all U.S. postsecondary students are first-generation scholars.

Despite this, first-generation scholars are less likely to utilize campus academic, career-planning and support services.



Finances

First-generation postsecondary scholars are likelier to come from socioeconomically disadvantaged and/or minority backgrounds. These intersections of identities can cause unique financial challenges and stress for first-gen students.

On average, parental income for first-generation scholars is approximately \$47,000. Scholars can apply for financial aid, grants, and scholarships to alleviate stress. Remember to file your FAFSA by May 15th.
